

THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

First Reading

Genesis 37.1-14a,17b-20,23-24,28

Jacob settled in the land where his father had lived as an alien, the land of Canaan. This is the story of the family of Jacob. Joseph, being seventeen years old, was shepherding the flock with his brothers; he was a helper to the sons of Bilhah and Zilpah, his father's wives; and Joseph brought a bad report of them to their father. Now Israel loved Joseph more than any other of his children, because he was the son of his old age; and he had made him a long robe with sleeves. But when his brothers saw that their father loved him more than all his brothers, they hated him, and could not speak peaceably to him.

Once Joseph had a dream, and when he told it to his brothers, they hated him even more. He said to them, "Listen to this dream that I dreamed. There we were, binding sheaves in the field. Suddenly my sheaf rose and stood upright; then your sheaves gathered around it, and bowed down to my sheaf." His brothers said to him, "Are you indeed to reign over us? Are you indeed to have dominion over us?" So they hated him even more because of his dreams and his words.

He had another dream, and told it to his brothers, saying, "Look, I have had another dream: the sun, the moon, and eleven stars were bowing down to me." But when he told it to his father and to his brothers, his father rebuked him, and said to him, "What kind of dream is this that you have had? Shall we indeed come, I and your mother and your brothers, and bow to the ground before you?" So his brothers were jealous of him, but his father kept the matter in mind.

Now his brothers went to pasture their father's flock near Shechem. And Israel said to Joseph, 'Are not your brothers pasturing the flock at Shechem? Come, I will send you to them.' He answered, 'Here I am.' So he said to him, 'Go now, see if it is well with your brothers and with the flock; and bring word back to me.'

So Joseph went after his brothers, and found them at Dothan. They saw him from a distance, and before he came near to them, they conspired to kill him. They said to one another, 'Here comes this dreamer. Come now, let us kill him and throw him into one of the pits; then we shall say that a wild animal

has devoured him, and we shall see what will become of his dreams.'

So when Joseph came to his brothers, they stripped him of his robe, the long robe with sleeves that he wore; and they took him and threw him into a pit. The pit was empty; there was no water in it.

When some Midianite traders passed by, they drew Joseph up, lifting him out of the pit, and sold him to the Ishmaelites for twenty pieces of silver. And they took Joseph to Egypt.

But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, 'Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid.' Peter answered him, 'Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water.' He said, 'Come.' So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came towards Jesus. But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, 'Lord, save me!' Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, 'You of little faith, why did you doubt? When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshipped him, saying, 'Truly you are the Son of God.' When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret. After the people of that place recognized him, they sent word throughout the region and brought all who were sick to him, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.

COVID-SAFE CHURCH LIFE

For the time being, we are continuing to have a single service each week: in the Cathedral at 9.00am on Sundays. This is subject to a careful health management plan, and services will be suspended should there be any reported COVID-19 cases in the local area.



There are a number of new requirements that we need to observe under the current NSW Pubic Health order as well as further instructions from the Bishop.

In addition to the ban on congregational singing, from last weekend we were also required to reduce the choir to just one person singing at any time and to ensure that person is 3m away from the congregation. This has required some additional changes to the Sunday morning liturgy, and we shall now have just the one hymn. This will be at the offertory and will only be sung by a cantor.

The service will begin with an Introit and conclude with the postlude. The sanctuary team will enter from the Vestry doors rather than a procession from the West End.

In addition, we are now encouraged to wear face masks while attending worship, and especially in situations where it is not possible to maintain the recommended 1.5m social distance.

We understand this to mean masks are not required when reading, leading the intercessions, preaching or presiding at the Altar as we have made careful arrangements to ensure appropriate social distancing since the COVID restrictions first applied in March. The priest who is serving the Sacrament will wear a face mask while doing that ministry.

Please remember that there can be no informal gatherings before or after the service.

Physical distancing (2 empty seats between people not in the same household) is required during services.

When work on the Cathedral roof begins shortly, we will access the Cathedral via the front steps and the Baptistry door as the ramp and northern side door will be enclosed in the security fencing.

REX CHILD

The Cathedral community was saddened to learn of Rex's recent passing and we extend our condolences to Nita and their extended family. Along with Rita, Rex was a well-known and much-loved member of the Southgate community as well as a stalwart of the Cathedral. Due to the current COVID pandemic there has not been the usual opportunities for celebrating Rex's life as we would wish, and this adds to the grief as well as deepening the impact of the pandemic.

ORGAN WORKS HAVE COMMENCED

Work on the rebuild of the organ console has begun. The old console has been dismantled and removed so that the rebuild can occur off-site. For the next few weeks we shall enjoy music from the grand piano while the organ is under repair.

SANCTUARY SEATS RESTORED

The three chairs for the ministers of the Altar have been repaired and re-stained as they were literally falling apart and had become unsafe to use. We appreciate the fine work of Miss Belles Furniture Restorations in taking such good care of these items. The cost of this work has been generously covered by an anonymous donation.


CATHEDRAL ROOF WORKS

The Cathedral has been a hive of activity lately, and there will soon be even more action about the place as work gets underway on the replacement of the roof and related water goods for the Chapel and the North Transept.

Contracts have been signed and all is set for work to commence later this month. An \$85,000 grant from Heritage NSW will assist with the project, with total costs estimated to be around \$225,000. The balance of costs will be covered the Cathedral Trust Funds, so we would very much welcome gifts to assist us with these essential works.



DEAN'S FORUM: John among the Gospels


