

WELCOME TO CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL

Welcome to the Cathedral Church of Christ the King, commonly referred to as *Christ Church Cathedral*.

Since its dedication on the Feast of St James (25 July) in 1884, the Cathedral has exercised a special role in the City of Grafton and also in the life of the Anglican Diocese of Grafton, whose parishes, schools and other agencies serve communities throughout the North Coast of New South Wales.

The Cathedral stands on the traditional lands of the Bundjalung nation. We acknowledge and pay our respect to their elders past and present, as well as to indigenous people with us today.

You are sharing in worship from *A Prayer Book for Australia*, which stands in the long Anglican tradition of 'common prayer' in which people, choir and clergy offer God and each other the best of ourselves ('our souls and our bodies') for the common good. We seek the peace and well-being of our nation, and especially our local community.

We are delighted that you are with us for this service: please come and worship with us again.

Whether you are Anglican, from another Christian Church or from another faith tradition, you are warmly welcome to take part in the service. If you want to find out more about the Christian faith, please make yourself known to a member of the clergy after the service.

The service today is a celebration of the Eucharist during which there will be an opportunity for people to receive Holy Communion. Communicant members of other Christian churches are invited to receive the Sacrament here today, as their own conscience allows. Everyone is welcome to come for a blessing, even if not receiving the consecrated Elements.

The Cathedral is open every day. You are always welcome to use the Cathedral and its grounds for prayer and reflection, and we encourage you to make this House of Prayer a place of pilgrimage and prayer for our City.


THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

O God, you are my God: eagerly will I seek you. My soul thirsts for you, my flesh longs for you: as a dry and thirsty land where no water is. **R**


So it was when I beheld you in the sanctuary: and saw your power and your glory. For your unchanging goodness is better than life: therefore my lips shall praise you. **R**

The gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Saint John (20:1–2,11–18) Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him."

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her."

This is the gospel of the Lord.

The Sermon

AN AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

Let us together affirm the faith of the church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made one being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, in the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

It is indeed right and good, our duty and our salvation, to praise you, the all-powerful Father, in every season, and on this holy day to celebrate the glory of your saints.

In Mary Magdalene you kindled a fire of love for Christ, whose word had set her free.
You gave her the courage of love to follow him even to the cross.

Seeking her teacher after his death, so great was her longing that you made her the first to behold him risen from the dead, and the first to announce to the apostles his new and glorious risen life.

Her words still ring throughout your Church, to strengthen faith and encourage hope in those who gather faithfully for prayer.

And so with her, and all the citizens of heaven, we join our voices to acclaim your glory in this their joyful hymn of praise:

Bishop Richard says the Blessing.



The icon of the Magdalene

In 1988, the Episcopal Church elected its first woman bishop, Barbara Harris, who was consecrated the following year (Harris is also African—American). To celebrate the event, Grace Cathedral in San Francisco commissioned an icon from Robert Lentz, who is presently a Franciscan friar. Partly because of his Eastern Christian religious background, Lentz has a deep interest in the icon as a form, which he adapts to strictly contemporary themes.

Lentz's art reflects his personal political beliefs, which lean strongly towards liberation theology, and to gay and feminist concerns.

His icon for Grace Cathedral adopted a figure dear to the hearts of Christian feminists, namely Mary Magdalene. According to a traditional story, Mary preached the message of Jesus to the Emperor of Rome, who was strongly sceptical. Pointing to some eggs, he said that he'd no more believe in Christ's resurrection than he would accept that those were really red rather than white. Mary picked up an egg, and it turned deep blood red.


Mary here appears as a witness of the resurrection, but also as a prominent Christian leader. The icon's inscription, in Syriac, tells us that she was "Equal to the Apostles." Lentz's message is that she recalls a lost and suppressed era of women's leadership in the early church, which is being restored in modern times. You can disagree with that argument on plenty of historical grounds – but the icon itself is still a lovely piece of work.

Incidentally, this Mary is physically a standard Middle Eastern woman, not the kind of European who so often stands in for Jesus's disciples in the great Renaissance tradition.

Mary's feast falls this week, on July 22.

Kids @ Table of Jesus




Everyone is welcome to claim their place at the table of Jesus. We encourage people to come for a blessing even if they are not receiving the Bread and the Wine. In particular, all the children of our faith community have a place at the Table of the Lord.

We offer family-based programs to assist young children to prepare to receive Holy Communion.

The next program is scheduled during Spring 2018, with the First Communion Sunday set for 18 November, one week

before the Cathedral's special celebrations for the Festival of Christ the King.

Children aged between 7 and 14 are invited to register now for this program. Older children, youth and adults will be offered an opportunity to prepare for Confirmation during the Cathedral festival on November 25. For children wishing to be prepared for Holy Communion but who have not yet been baptised, we will arrange for Baptism prior to November 18.



Reading with Spiritual Eyes

Each school term we choose a book of fiction to be read by participants, and then we meet in the Edwards Hall adjacent to the Cathedral Bookshop for 90 minutes (6.00—7.30pm) to discuss the chosen book and reflect on ways in in which this book engages with our spiritual wisdom.

For the third school term of 2018, the chosen book is Book of Colours by Robyn Cadwallader.

We meet to discuss this book from a spiritual perspective on Tuesday, September 11 at 6.00pm. Please bring a plate of some light food to share. Copies of the book will be available for purchase through the Cathedral Bookshop.



NEWS ON KITCHEN UPGRADE

During the week we received approval from the Building and Properties Committee of the Diocese for work to proceed on replacing the kitchen in the Edwards Hall. Work has already begun and we aim to have this completed in time for the consecration of our new Bishop on September 29. The estimated cost is \$50,000 and the Diocese has agreed that unused funds from the Donnelly Bequest not needed for the installation of the fans can be applied to this project. That will cover about half the costs. Gifts to assist with the remaining half would be greatly appreciated.



CATHEDRAL SCHOLARSHIPS

In 2019 the Cathedral will be offering several scholarships for local children who want to sing in the Choir. These will be equivalent to one third of the annual fees for a student at CVAS, with one scholarship being offered at each of the following year levels: 3–4, 5–6, 7–8, 9–10 and 11–12.

Children who are not attending CVAS are welcome to apply.
