All the candles on around the Advent wreath in Church will be lit including the white candle in the middle of the wreath. I do not know about you, but I love Christmas, many people do, but it is a good time to spare a thought for those who don't have family or friends to share it with or cannot celebrate the day in the way they would like to.
