Welcome to the Cathedral Church of Christ the King.

We especially welcome the 2019 Jacaranda Queen and the Jacaranda Princesses, giving thanks for their commitment to the well-being of our community and remembering all those who will benefit from the funds they have raised this year.

Our service this evening is Evening Prayer (First Order) from *A Prayer Book for Australia*. This service follows the ancient pattern of prayer which was modified by the Church of England at the time of the Reformation to create a set of services for morning and evening each day. English church musicians soon set the services to music.

'Choral Evensong' is simply the service of Evening Prayer sung with the assistance of a choir. It is classic and distinctive form of Anglican liturgy with roots in Catholic prayer practices and beyond that to even older Jewish worship ("seven times a day will I praise you" – Psalm 119.164).

The setting for our service this evening is the Grafton Setting, composed by Robert Eather, our Director of Music.

The Cathedral Choir will lead us in singing the responses and will also sing the canticles and an anthem.

We are delighted to welcome the Salvation Army band, who will accompany the organ during our hymns.

Our preacher this evening is the Revd Adrian Van Ash from the Grafton Presbyterian fellowship.

During the service there will be a collection with the funds raised to benefit the ecumenical Special Religious Education program in our local schools.

Refreshments will be served inside the west door of the Cathedral after the service.

Psalm 84

- 3 The sparrow has found her a home, and the swallow a nest where she may lay her young: even your altar, O Lord of hosts, my King and my God.
- 4 Blessed are those who dwell in your house: they will always be praising you.

The first Reading, from the Old Testament

A reading from the book of the prophet Jeremiah, chapter 14, beginning at verse 7.

Although our iniquities testify against us, act, O LORD, for your name's sake; our apostasies indeed are many, and we have sinned against you. O hope of Israel, its saviour in time of trouble, why should you be like a stranger in the land, like a traveller turning aside for the night? Why should you be like someone confused, like a mighty warrior who cannot give help? Yet you, O LORD, are in the midst of us, and we are called by your name; do not forsake us!

Thus says the LORD concerning this people: Truly they have loved to wander, they have not restrained their feet; therefore the LORD does not accept them, now he will remember their iniquity and punish their sins.

Have you completely rejected Judah? Does your heart loathe Zion? Why have you struck us down so that there is no healing for us? We look for peace, but find no good; for a time of healing, but there is terror instead. We acknowledge our wickedness, O LORD, the iniquity of our ancestors, for we have sinned against you. Do not spurn us, for your name's sake; do not dishonour your glorious throne; remember and do not break your covenant with us. Can any idols of the nations bring rain? Or can the heavens give showers? Is it not you, O LORD our God? We set our hope on you, for it is you who do all this.

After the reading, the reader says 'Here ends the first reading'.

The second Reading, from the New Testament

A reading from the Gospel according to St Luke, chapter 18, beginning at verse 31.

Then he took the twelve aside and said to them, "See, we are going up to Jerusalem, and everything that is written about the Son of Man by the prophets will be accomplished. For he will be handed over to the Gentiles; and he will be mocked and insulted and spat upon. After they have flogged him, they will kill him, and on the third day he will rise again." But they understood nothing about all these things; in fact, what he said was hidden from them, and they did not grasp what was said.

As he approached Jericho, a blind man was sitting by the roadside begging. When he heard a crowd going by, he asked what was happening. They told him, "Jesus of Nazareth is passing by." Then he shouted, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Those who were in front sternly ordered him to be quiet; but he shouted even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" Jesus stood still and ordered the man to be brought to him; and when he came near, he asked him, "What do you want me to do for you?" He said, "Lord, let me see again." Jesus said to him, "Receive your sight; your faith has saved you." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him, glorifying God; and all the people, when they saw it, praised God."
