WELCOME TO CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL

Welcome to the Cathedral Church of Christ the King, commonly referred to as *Christ Church Cathedral*.

Since its dedication on the Feast of St James (25 July) in 1884, the Cathedral has exercised a special role in the City of Grafton and also in the life of the Anglican Diocese of Grafton, whose parishes, schools and other agencies serve communities throughout the Northern Rivers of New South Wales.

The Cathedral stands on the traditional lands of the Bundjalung nation. We acknowledge and pay our respect to their elders past and present, as well as to indigenous people with us today.

You are sharing in worship from *A Prayer Book for Australia*, which stands in the long Anglican tradition of 'common prayer' in which people, choir and clergy offer God and each other the best of ourselves ('our souls and our bodies') for the common good. We seek the peace and well-being of our nation, and especially our local community.

We are delighted that you are with us for this service: please come and worship with us again.

Whether you are Anglican, from another Christian Church or from another faith tradition, you are warmly welcome to take part in the service. If you want to find out more about the Christian faith, please make yourself known to a member of the clergy after the service.

The service today is a Baptism within a celebration of the Eucharist during which there will be an opportunity for people to receive Holy Communion. Communicant members of other Christian churches are invited to receive the Sacrament here today, as their own conscience allows. Everyone is welcome to come for a blessing, even if not receiving the consecrated Elements.

The Cathedral is open every day. You are always welcome to use the Cathedral and its grounds for prayer and reflection, and we encourage you to make this House of Prayer a place of pilgrimage and prayer for our City.

The Hymn of Praise, Gloria in excelsis.

The Psalm [Psalm 33:1–9]



The Sermon

AN AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

God creates all things, renews all things and celebrates all things.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

A minister says

Let us pray for the world and the Church.

Loving God, creator of the Universe, you know every creature and its needs. With great trust we pray in the name of all creation. Creator God, **hear our prayer.**

We give thanks for the beauty and abundance of the earth, our home, which you created for us to enjoy and sustain. We pray for all Clergy and people of faith in our Diocese and everywhere and those charged with responsibility to make decisions which affect us all. As people called into a covenant relationship with you, we pray for grace to live in harmony with your creation, and for wisdom and generosity in our use of its bounty. Creator God, **hear our prayer.**

We pray for the leaders of nations that they may speak out against exploitation of the resources of the earth. In an environmental catastrophe we pray for those living in poverty, silenced by the realities of global life but suffering the devastating effects of flood, drought, fire and climate change. Creator God, hear our prayer.

Give a spirit of concern for the future of our environment to all human beings. Bring an end to war and strife, so that people may no longer mourn and stand upon the rubble of destruction. May we live as responsible stewards and protect and respect the gift of creation God has placed in our hands. We pray that future generations may learn from the present and live simply and in harmony with all creation. Creator God, hear our prayer.

We give thanks for the City of Grafton, the fellowship of the community in which we live and for the Clarence Valley Council and all who care for our parks, gardens and trees. We pray for the health of the Clarence River and the land of the valley, which gives abundant life to creatures of water, land and air. Creator God, hear our prayer.

We pray for those in need. We give thanks that you are the God who brings mercy and wholeness. Give us strength and courage to change our ways, so this Earth may flourish under our care. Comfort and heal, we pray, all who are in sorrow, need, sickness, or any other trouble, especially those who have asked for prayer: Roy Ford, Ruth Kingsley, Jan Pitt and Tammy Uren. Give to those who care for them wisdom, patience and gentleness and, to us all, your peace. Creator God, hear our prayer.

All creation lives and dies according to the cycle of life and returns to the dust from which we are made, but at the end of all things you will raise us to life to the community of your eternal kingdom. Fill us with your Spirit in our days on this Earth, so we may be fit and ready for the new heaven and new Earth you promise.

Almighty God, you have promised to hear our prayers.

Through Jesus Christ, teach us to be at one with Earth. Make our spirits sensitive to the cries of creation, cries for justice from the seas, the skies and the land. Make our souls sensitive to the songs of our kin, songs of celebration from the sea, the land and the air. Teach us to care for our planet home. Amen.

Anyone who would normally receive Holy Communion in their own Christian tradition is welcome to receive the Sacrament with us here today. Those who prefer to receive a personal blessing from the priest rather than Holy Communion are invited to come to the Altar and simply cross their arms in front of them so the priest knows their desire.
