• Prologue 1:1-18 • John the Baptist & call of the disciples 1:(6-8) 19-51 • Cana-Jerusalem-Samaria-Cana 2 - 4 • Jerusalem 5

• Galilee (by the lake) 6

• Jerusalem (Sukkoth) then retire to Samaria 7 - 10

The Gospel according to John

- · No infancy traditions
- Call of disciples at baptism site (not in Galilee)
- Cana is major Galilean ministry location (not Capernaum, Bethsaida, etc)
- Temple incident at beginning of Jesus' ministry
- · Raising of Lazarus
- $\bullet\,$ Fewer miracles and they are understood as 'signs' not 'deeds of power'
- No exorcisms at all
- Last Supper features footwashing not bread and cup
- After Easter commissioning of disciples for ministry





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The Gospel according to John

Compared with the Synoptic Tradition

Synoptic Gospels Gospel of John • Location • Towns Capernaum, Nazareth, Jer Jerusalem, Cana, lakeside Religion Sabbath, synagogues Festivals in the temple • Opponents Scribes, Pharisees, Herod "the Jews" \mathcal{E} (less so) Pharisees Passover only 1 $3\ mentioned$

 Duration 12-18 months (?) 2-3 years (?)

Synoptic Gospels Gospel of John

· Origins Infancy narratives Logos hymn • Birthplace Bethlehem Galilee (not Bethlehem)

• Baptism Described Assumed • Crisis Temptations Gethsemane prayer Identity like Moses/Eliiah divine revealer of truth • Audience poor & powerless those in darkness & sin (ignorance)

Synoptic Gospels Gospel of John

• Title son of Man Son of God, the Son, Son of the Father

 Speech parables & aphorisms complex long discourses Topic look, the kingdom's here Jesus, the Son Glorified Transfiguration Crucifixion ('the hour')

• Last Supper Bread & wine Foot washing (cf. ch 6 Bread of Heaven)

 Trial silent Jesus discussion with Pilate

Gospel of John **Synoptic Gospels**

 Message kingdom of God knowledge, belief, eternal life

• Healing miracles deeds of power (dynameis) signs (semeia) common · Exorcisms not one example

· Know this judgment, Eschaton believe in me, receive the Spirit Death crucified with 2 others crucified alone

· At the cross Mary & Beloved Disciple women watching Peter, the Eleven Magdalene, Thomas Easter

• Spirit Galilee / Pentecost Easter night

The Gospel according to John

Raymond E. Brown suggested the following process:

- Early traditional collections about Jesus, including a collection of miracles ('signs') and a passion narrative (Mark?)
- · Developed into typical Johannine patterns through preaching and teaching over an $extended\ period\ of\ time\ (and\ within\ the\ particular\ context\ of\ exclusion\ from\ Jewish\ life)$
- · Arranged into a consecutive document by one leader in that community
- Some secondary expansion, perhaps by same person?
- Final redaction by a disciple of the author adds the Temple incident in ch 2, the Eucharistic words in ch 6 and the Lazarus material in chs 11-12.



The Gospel according to John

Overview

The Gospel of John provides us with a distinctive:

- Story about Jesus (don't mortgage truth to historicity)
- Language about Jesus (devotional Christology)
- Understanding of Jesus (emphasis on divinity of Jesus)
- Context (painful separation from the synagogues)
- Historical insight (early Christianity rather than historical Jesus)

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The Gospel according to John

Why John?

First ending:

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

(John 20:30-31 NRSV)

Second ending:

This is the disciple who is testifying to these things and has written them, and we know that his testimony is true. But there are also many other things that Jesus did; if every one of them were written down, I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written.

(John 21:24-25 NRSV)
